

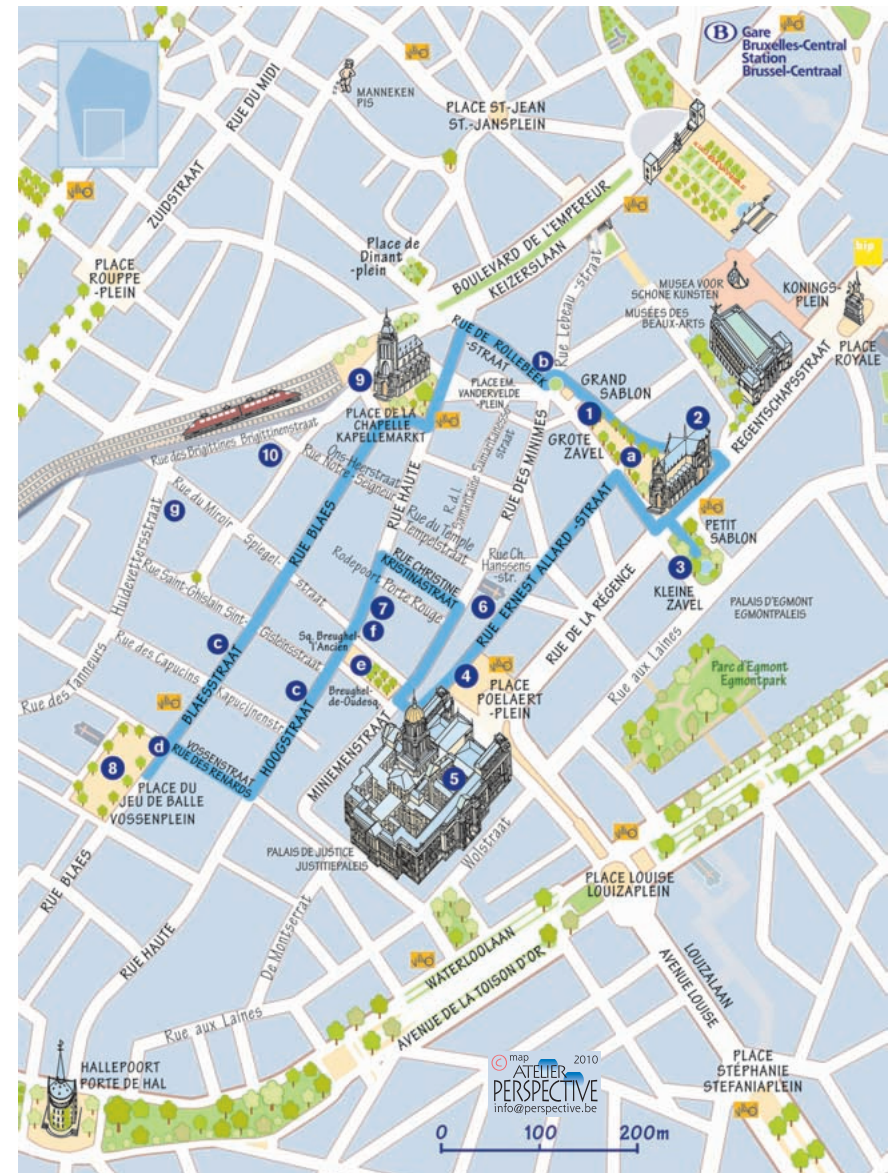
From the Sablon to the Marolles

- b **Dandoy**, the oldest biscuit shop in Brussels.
- c **Interior decoration shops** and bric-a-brac, Rue Haute and Rue Blaes.
- d **Rue des Renards and Place du Jeu de Balle** for their popular pubs.
- e **The Square Breughel l'Ancien**, below the Law Courts for its pavement cafés.
- f **Ploegmans**, between traditional and trendy over a Faro and a stoemp.
- g **Les Halles des Tanneurs**, a setting just waiting to be discovered.



Many antique dealers and shops are open from Wednesday to Sunday. The weekend is the best time to visit this area: markets are held on Sundays and the shops stay open until around 3 p.m.

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
